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DVM Launches Webinar Series



Students of Trinity High School, River Forest, Ill. face each other to engage ideas in their English class. This format supports discourse. One student shared, "I like hearing other people's ideas and questions- it helps me develop my understanding even more!"

This fall, Dominican Veritas Ministries is exploring disputatio. Our first webinar of the 2024-25 season featured Edward Dunar, PhD, Director of Meister Eckhart Center for Catholic and Dominican Life at Albertus Magnus College. Dr. Dunar highlighted the inter-religious history of disputatio and its value to the Dominican order over the centuries. Quoting Sr. Megan McElroy, OP, Prioress of the Dominican Sisters Grand Rapids, Dunar stated:

"disputatio...is a style of dialogue that allows each party to listen-deeply-to the other's position for what is right and true, and together the two parties come closer to the truth."

A second webinar, hosted by Nate Friday, DVM's Director of Formation, occurred in early October to support schools' efforts to build the framework of disputatio into classroom, boardroom, and community-wide conversations. Attendees included administrators, board members, faculty, and even a classroom of students. DVM invites the schools to study disputatio as a valuable approach to seek truth and navigate difficult conversations. Future webinar topics include a discussion with Dominican Sisters titled, Engaging the Legacy of the Sisters, and Integrating the Mission Throughout the Full School

Community.



This summer we were particularly focused on setting a positive and unifying tone for the year knowing that the November elections would likely bring increased divisiveness into our community (and our country). Our school year theme of "Build



Throughout the month of August, every teacher in every classroom engaged students in conversations around our school-wide expectations for staying curious. 

The Story Continues.....A History of St.Mary's Dominican High School 1860-2021 New book released by Sr. Mary Dominic Savio Estorage, OP



We often talk about it—taking time to write the story or history of something important—yet rarely is it easy it to accomplish. DVM celebrates Sr. Mary Dominic Savio Estorge, OP for completing the first written history of St. Mary's Dominican High School, founded in 1860 in New Orleans, Louisiana by the Dominican Sisters of Mary of Cabra, Ireland.

"She was the perfect person to write it," said Dr. Cynthia Thomas, President of St. Mary's Dominican High School. "Sister's love of the Dominican Order, extraordinarily long tenure (61 years) and her past leadership roles with the Dominican Sisters Congregation all offer a unique perspective to be preserved and shared." Sr. Savio hopes that the history she has penned, "awakens mostly good memories and gratitude for what we learned those many years ago—or just this past semester—and how it had impacted our lives." Sr. Savio's distinguished career includes: Assistant Principal (1973-1976); President (1994-1997); and English Department Faculty and Chairperson.

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
