4 EDUCATION	Goal 4 – Quality Education	Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all How might I support educational opportunities for children through mentoring programs, tutoring or sharing
		financial resources?

Although there has been much progress in global education, the barriers holding children back from reaching their full potential through quality education still exist. When educated, young people are more likely to have the self-confidence and knowledge to better both their communities and their own livelihoods. Worldwide children's education is an important tool in the overall reduction of global poverty. So why aren't children going to school?

- 1. A country's lack of funding for education contributes not only to the absence of actual schools and materials but a low quantity and quality of teachers as well.
- 2. Their families are poor. When a child's parents are illiterate, unemployed or sick, all factors contributing to poverty, the risk of that child either dropping out of school or not going to school at all are doubled.
- 3. Children's education rates drop during times of war or conflict.
- 4. Poor families often see no other option than to marry off their female children, a major cause of a lack of worldwide children's education, particularly for girls.
- 5. School is too far away. In an impoverished country where the children are hungry,

disabled and responsible for working around the house, this is simply too much time to invest.

- 6. They have to work. Eleven percent of children are child-laborers, which comes to 168 million young people.
- 7. They or their families are sick. Even in firstworld countries, illness can be a huge barrier for children's education.
- 8. They are female. Females account for 54 percent of the non-schooled population globally.
- 9. They are hungry. According to the Global Citizen, "Being severely malnourished, to the point, it impacts on brain development, can be the same as losing four grades of schooling." <u>https://sustainabledevelopment.un.org/sdgs</u>

		How can I support dignified and valued work for all laborers in my workplace? How can I support dignified and valued work for all laborers in the businesses I patronize?

Sustainable economic growth will require societies to create the conditions that allow people to have quality jobs that stimulate the economy while not harming the environment. Decent work involves opportunities for



work that is productive and delivers a fair income, security in the workplace and social protection for families, better prospects for personal development and social integration, freedom for people to express their concerns, organize and participate in the decisions that affect their lives and equality of opportunity and treatment for all women and men.

- 1. The global unemployment rate stood at 5.6% in 2017, down from 6.4% in 2000, and corresponds to 192.7 million unemployed persons.
- 2. Unemployment among youth (aged 15 to 24) reached 13% in 2014, nearly three times higher than the rate for adults.
- 3. In 2017 there were around 300 million workers in extreme poverty, living on less than US\$1.90 per day.
- 4. Only 29% of the global population has comprehensive social security; the other 71% are not, or only partially, protected.
- 5. Fewer than 45% of wage and salaried workers are employed on a full-time, permanent basis, and even that share is declining.
- 6. Globally, 61% of all workers were engaged in informal employment in 2016.

- 7. According to the International Labor Organization, there are some 168 million children currently living under slave-like conditions of forced labor, and a great part of that number comes from the production of goods that we consume daily in our lives such as coffee, cotton and chocolate.
- 8. Men earn 12.5% more than women in 40 out of 45 countries with data.
- 9. In high-income countries, almost every adult has an account at a bank or other financial institution, compared to only 35% of adults in low-income countries. Across all regions, women lag behind men in this regard.
- 10. 500-600 million new jobs need to be created by 2030, just to keep pace with the growth of the working age population
