We give thanks for all those women who lived and worked, celebrated and flourished, in so many places during 150 years of that preaching.

Leader:

Dominican women – so many years apart – yet they are all women holding dreams – surviving transitions. In 1873 did Kentucky prepare the six young women to educate 400 poor immigrant children? In 1965 when Pope John XXIII called us to Latin America to begin the journey into enculturation, insertion, liberation theology, and mutuality did we

trust the Spirit? In 1986 did Springfield challenge the first four Peruvian novices to have a deeper engagement with people, their needs, and their hopes?

All:

May the boulders that support the integrity of our lives continue to be prayer, study, common life, and service.

Leader:

Somewhere in this land of elsewhere, a portion of the dream passed from the brave women of Kentucky Bluegrass to the preachers and poets of Incan roots – Sisters and Associates. Counterparts across the years, all women and men of compassion, integrity, and courage, all Dominicans of truth, non-violence and hospitality, they struggle to live in solidarity, with the potential to bless all on the unending frontiers.
